the English Channel and not made it. To be a good distance swimmer, you need to be able to <u>stand</u> cold water for long periods of time. Most importantly, you need to have a very positive <u>mindset</u>. When I decide on a swim, I know in my head that I can do it — in fact, I've already done it because I've imagined it. I use a lot of neurolinguistic programming (NLP) techniques. I also train people to be NLP <u>practitioners</u>. Success isn't about achieving world records. It's about expanding potential. It's about setting realistic goals and believing you can achieve them.

**In the evening**, I often have council meetings to attend. We answer <u>residents</u>' concerns, and plan and discuss issues. At home, I like to watch a bit of TV, especially drama. I don't watch much sport these days. I prefer doing it.

I've always used my swims to <u>raise</u> money for children's <u>hospices</u> and cancer <u>charities</u>. I received my <u>MBE</u>, as well as my <u>honorary doctorate</u> from Loughborough University, for services to swimming and charity. There's always more to **achieve** out there. And I hope to carry on swimming. Days just don't feel right without a swim.

## Lake District

The Lake District is England's largest national park and a place famous for its natural beauty. Located in the north-west, this region of lakes and low mountains is also associated with the poet William Wordsworth (1770–1850). He lived in the area and even wrote a guide book about it. His poem "I Wandered Lonely as a Cloud" about <u>daffodils</u> "dancing in the breeze" near the lakes is an English classic. Other poets and writers, such as Samuel Taylor Coleridge (1772–1834) and Beatrix Potter (1866–1943), are also associated with the area.

## councillor

Julie Bradshaw is a councillor — that is, a member of a town council in Britain. She tells us that her work includes talking with the residents of her town about their needs and problems. Julie is also a counsellor, a word that looks similar to and has the same pronunciation as "councillor", but which means a person who is trained to give advice. Both words come from Latin: councillor comes from *concilium*, which means "an <u>assembly</u> of people"; counsellor comes from *consilium*, which means "consultation or advice". Use the correct word in the following sentences:

## achieve

The verb "achieve" is important when describing goals and ambitions. It comes from Old French *achever* — "to bring or come to a head" — which is related to *chief*, meaning "head". *Chief* is from Latin for head: *caput*, and corresponds to the English "chief", meaning "head" in the sense of "leader". To achieve something, it helps to be the leader of the activity. That way, you are in a good position to control it and make sure that it gets results. Practise using the verb here:

a) Have you	any of your goals?
b) I enjoy	things and seeing the results.
